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Local Context

Contra Costa County has a history of relatively few local amendments to State Building Code

Increased Board interest in climate and energy-related issues resulted in 2 proposed reach codes since 2015:

- Amendments for EV charging in 2015
- Amendments for res. rooftop solar in 2017

Board-Approved EVCS Amendments Adopted in December 2015

- □ No change to State Code requirements for SFRs
- Requires installation of charging device (not just electrical infrastructure) for new MFRs greater than 3 units, and up to 5% of parking spaces for large projects
- Requires installation of charging device for Non-Res projects with more than 10 parking spaces, and up to 6% of parking spaces for large projects

Amendments for Rooftop Solar Proposed, not Adopted in 2017

- County staff proposed a modified version of the Model Solar Ordinance sponsored by BayREN and BAAQMD requiring installation of rooftop solar on new homes
- Building Industry Association advocated that the added upfront cost would discourage housing construction and asked Board to hold off in anticipation of requirements in 2019 CBC



Acceptance of reach codes may be less predictable in the absence of public outreach

□ Not clear if additional outreach would have changed outcome

Reach codes must compete with the current trend towards decreased regulation of residential construction to promote more housing
